History

Claes Johnny 04/04/2008

At 18.19 hours on 4 Apr, 1941, the Conus (Master Charles Asquith), dispersed from convoy OB-304, was hit in the foreship by one G7e torpedo from U-97 and stopped southeast of Cape Farewell. The U-boat then fired its las' two torpedoes at 19.08 and 20.06 hours. The tanker capsized and sank within 10 minutes after the third torpedo hit. The master and 56 crew members and two gunners were lost.
