# History

Allen Tony 20/04/2009

The San Hilario was a British Steam Tanker of 10,157 tons built in 1913 by Palmers' SB. & Iron Co., Ltd., Newcastle and owned by Eagle Oil Transport Co., Ltd., London.

On the 20th April 1917 when she was on route from Puerto Mexico for Queenstown carrying a cargo of petroleum she was torpedoed and sunk by German submarine U-43 when 270 miles W x N of the Fastnet.

Original founders: Brothers Charles Mark and George Palmer from Jarrow, Newcastle Upon-Tyne. - - - Charles Palmer established a yard at Jarrow in 1851 and built its first iron collier 'The John Bowes' in the following year. It was the first ever sea-going screw collier and wa built for shipping coal to London. Palmers were also famed for building the first rolled armour plates for warships in 1854. Fautnet Rock
